For this analysis, I would like you to consider the menu you borrowed from your partner in class. (If you missed class, simply use a menu you found yourself). Consider the following questions as you write your mini-analysis. Keep in mind that you aren't simply writing answers to these questions, but should be writing a paragraph that hangs together, i.e. it should read like a concise, articulated argument about the menu's rhetorical stance/tools. See the A&B Guide sections on visual analysis and audience/purpose/genre, as well as the "language of menus" BB posting, for additional background.

This mini-analysis should be at least 500 words to sufficiently cover the material.

- 1. What immediately strikes you about the menu when you look at it? Why do you think that is?
- 2. Does it use any visual elements (i.e. pictures, layout, etc.) to influence how you "read" it?
- 3. How would you describe the language being used (such as Simple? Elegant? Complex? Difficult?) Give specific examples to back up your analysis.
- 4. Who do you think the "audience" for this menu is? Why do you think that?
- 5. What do you think the "purpose" of the menu is?
- 6. Would you eat here based on your conclusions about the restaurant drawn from the menu? Why or why not? (don't just tell me "no, because I don't like _____." You should tie this determination to your analysis in some way.)
